Pastor Al's Message

"All who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart." (Luke 2:18-19)

This coming Sunday, the Gospel narrative tells of John the Baptist calling his audience to prepare the way in the wilderness. In this ongoing period of the pandemic, our assigned scriptures continue to take on new and powerful perspectives.

I hear that word, "wilderness," and I have to believe that many of us feel like we are in a wilderness right now. I have to imagine that many of us feel worn down, anxious, even angry at times. How do we not get bogged down in our own struggles? And I must say that in the big picture my struggles are minor compared to so many. So, how do we move beyond becoming focused on our self?

I am moved by these words from Luke's narrative of the Nativity. I believe they may hold inspiration as to how we can move forward well. I want to suggest that we look to Mary, Joseph and Jesus. They were truly facing dark and uncertain times. They are away from home. They are in a makeshift shelter; a stable. Jesus is in bands of cloth and laid in a manger. Soon they would have to flee as refugees to Egypt because of Herod's death threats. Let us look to the Holy Family, and especially Mary and her times of pondering.

"To possess a secret joy and to hold a marvelous mystery in mind and heart is to rise above the grind of daily life." I'm not sure where I heard this quote, but it often times guides me as it hangs on the bulletin board by my office desk. Centering the self on the things that are most precious, opens a space of serenity where one can truly be at rest. In that sacred space, we can ponder on God's surprises; there we can dare to know the heart of God and feel goodness and grace.

It is true that God comes not only in those serene moments, but just as Jesus came wrapped in the swaddling clothes, our experience of God, at times, comes in the midst of the struggles and sorrows of this world. I do hear this as good news in this moment. Our lives right now may not be filled with ease and comfort, but those things are fleeting anyway. We have the promise of something so much deeper and fulfilling.

Seeing God can be challenged by clatter and clamor, but when the truth of why Jesus has come resides deep within us, we can be the ones who can offer stillness right in the middle of chaos. We can be the ones who can ponder the possibilities that everyone else struggles to comprehend. When we have been touched by the truth of who God revealed Godself to be in Jesus, we can see the arrival of the Kingdom of God where it often is revealed; in the weak and the ordinary.

Given our new normal, it is a good time to help all ages engage in faith practices in our homes.

- What affect would it have on our relationships to engage in three simple faith practices a day?
- What affect would it have on the future of our congregations if we were intentional about our conversations, Bible reading, and prayer?
- How can just four weeks during Advent challenge us to gain an understanding
 of the essential role the home has—and always has had—in the life of the
 church?



- The word gospel means good news. How is the coming of Christ into our world good news for you?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Mark 1:1-8.

The beginning of a book helps set up what the book is about and where the story is going. This is true of the Gospel of Mark as well. Mark 1:1-8 is part of Mark's prologue (vv. 1-13) and was used in ancient writings with this very purpose in mind: to give information that helps people follow the story as it unfolds. Mark's point is that good news ("good tidings" in Isaiah 40:9), the gospel, is beginning to happen through Jesus Christ, the Son of God. This good news is linked to John the baptizer who is himself reminiscent of Elijah. When Elijah comes again, God's people will encounter God's promised deliverance (Malachi 4:5). That future time is now present through John and through Jesus. John's message of repentance (v. 4) will be continued by Jesus when he says, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news" (Mark 1:14). Where do you see the good news of Jesus happening today?

Pray: Merciful God, we thank you for fulfilling your promise of hope and peace through the good news of Jesus Christ. Amen.

SERVICE



Good news has a positive effect on people. Isaiah 40 gives prophetic comfort to God's people. What word of comfort or encouragement can you give to someone this week?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Set up a Christmas nativity set in your home. Place the wise men further away from the set for now. Wait to place Jesus in the manger until Christmas Eve. On your Advent wreath, light the first candle of hope and the second one of peace. Pause for a moment to sit in silence and look upon the nativity set and think about the coming of Jesus.

Say this Bible verse: Let me hear what God the Lord will speak, for he will speak peace to his people. (Psalm 85:8a)

Pray: Lord, help us to prepare the way of the Lord. Give us peace and hope. Amen.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Think or talk about a time when you felt sad or brokenhearted.
- When you feel discouraged, who do you talk to or what do you do to feel better?
- Jesus comes to change our lives. How does Jesus make a difference for your life and the lives of others?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11.

An American emailed his friend in Zimbabwe and asked if he was well. The response was "I am well if you are well." That response comes with a communal understanding of wellness. We can't be well on our own. Neither can we truly feel okay about ourselves if we feel safe and protected while our neighbor does not feel okay. Isaiah 61:1-2 brings good news for all, including—and especially—the oppressed, the brokenhearted, captives, prisoners, those who mourn and those who owe debts (The year of the Lord's favor was a time to forgive debts). God's work of justice and mercy that brings joy will be seen in all the nations (v. 11) and is for all, not just a select and privileged few. How do you see the wellbeing of others as important to your own wellbeing?

Pray: God of justice, we give you thanks that your goodness and mercy is for us and for all the world through Christ our Lord. Amen. (Isaiah 61:11)

SERVICE



There is a theme of joy in our readings this week. This joy includes God's promise to overcome pain, disappointment, and fear. Think of someone currently experiencing difficulties. How can you be the hands and voice of God's good news to that person this week?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



Place the wise men further away from the nativity set for now. Wait to place Jesus in the manger until Christmas Eve. On your Advent wreath, light the first candle of hope, the second one of peace, and the third one of joy. Pause for a moment to sit in silence and look upon the nativity set and think about the good news and joy the coming of Jesus brings us.

Say this Bible verse: Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

Pray: Lord God, thank you for being with us in times of sadness and times of joy. Give us hope, peace and joy as we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Amen.

WEEKLY MILESTONES

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

CARING CONVERSATIONS



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- When have you received special attention from friends or family?
- Think of someone you have valued as a friend. In what ways do you value them?
- The angel Gabriel describes Mary as favored. What does it mean to you that God has given the world our Savior and Lord Jesus through Mary, a young peasant girl?

DEVOTIONS



Read: Luke 1:26-38.

In verses 28 and 30 the angel Gabriel says that Mary is favored, that is, Mary experiences the undeserved kindness of God. In Luke 2:40 and 52 the child Jesus is also described as favored. Divine attention comes to a young virgin to deliver Jesus, the Son of the Most High. The beginning of the Gospel of Luke tells of Elizabeth, a barren woman who gives birth, Mary, a peasant girl who gives birth to the future king in the lineage of David, and of shepherds in the field who will be the first evangelists of the good news of Jesus' birth (Luke 2:18). The message is clear: with God all things are possible, and as with Mary, our faithful response is, "let it be with me according to your word" (v. 38). Mary is the model of the life of faith that acknowledges that God has done great things for her. As we prepare to enter the season of Jesus' birth, we are met with God's favor and blessings for us as well. How has God come to you with divine favor?

Pray: God of undeserved kindness, give us faith to trust that with you all things are possible through Christ Jesus our Lord, Son of the Most High God. Amen.

SERVICE



During this Advent season think of those who are not favored in our society. For example, the homeless are poor, hungry, and in need. In what ways can you show God's love to them through an act of kindness?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS



From your nativity set, hold each piece in silence for a moment. Then place the pieces back in the scene. Have Mary and Joseph arrive first, followed by the shepherds and then the wise men. Wait to place Jesus in the manger until Christmas Eve. On your Advent wreath, light the first candle of hope, the second one of peace, the third one of joy, and the fourth one of love. Say this Bible verse: For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. (John 3:16)

Pray: Lord God, thank you for showing us love even when we are afraid like Mary, the mother of Jesus. Give us hope, peace, joy, and love as we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Amen.
